You are invited to a workshop on assignment design. The facilitators will introduce design principles and you will participate in an assignment charrette: a collaborative, positive process where you give and receive feedback on your assignment within a concentrated time frame. We ask that you bring five copies of an assignment you would like to share with your peers in conversations around how to better align or strengthen assignments. Please bring the assignment in the form that you present it to students along with a rubric or set of criteria used to evaluate it. You will work in smaller groups with colleagues to discuss the assignments you bring. The goal is to share what you're working on with others who will ask good questions, offer suggestions, prompt consequential reflection...and also learn from what you're doing. You are encouraged to bring an assignment designed to foster one or more of the following skills: written communication, critical thinking, and quantitative reasoning.

Lunch will be provided (12:00 pm).

After lunch, you will learn about an excellent assignment resource and opportunity for faculty scholarship: the **assignment library** coordinated by the National Institute for Learning Outcomes Assessment. Next, the facilitators will discuss **rubric design and tips** for a successful rubric to accompany your assignment.
